



Our task was to take PASSCHENDAELE and it was already half accomplished by the efforts of the 3rd and 4th Divisions. Later, when our task at YPRES had been accomplished remained we would return to the front we had recently left at LENS and that when the proper time came the Corps would undertake the operation that was in contemplation before orders were received to move north.





			The relief of the 19th Battalion by the 54th Battalion proceeded smoothly and was reported complete by 10:30 p.m. The relief of the 18th Battalion by the 87th Battalion was not so fortunate. Three Companies were successfully guided into position, but the fourth which was to relieve the left Company in the line, unfortunately had its guides knocked out. Fresh guides were obtained but these appeared to have little knowledge of the route to be followed. The night was particularly dark and the Company became lost. Daylight found them near the railway south of Hillside Farm. Relief of the left Company was therefore postponed until dusk on the 13th November.

10 PM – 13 NOV 1917

The inky blackness of the night makes it very difficult to find one's way. The C.T. does not extend further than Hillside Farm and runs about 75 yards to the north of it. Between Hillside Farm and the Zonnebeke-Passchendaele road the high ground is dotted with small parties, stretcher, ration parties, etc., who have lost their way and are shouting for direction. The mist is heavy and visual signalling is impossible. The enemy's harassing fire is heavy and very troublesome. That runners are able to deliver their messages and that rations are safely delivered to the various Companies, is due only to the magnificent perseverance and splendid courage of the rank and file.

530 pm 14 NOV 1917

The pronounced salient in which we lie allows the enemy to concentrate his artillery fire very effectively on the brigade area. Our men have not as yet been called upon to withstand a counter-attack but the density of the hostile artillery fire (greater than has ever been experienced by our men save perhaps that of St. Eloi and Zillebeke in April and June, 1916, respectively), makes hanging on no easy task. On our particular front we hold the high ground. The eastern slopes of the ridge are for the most part very wet and swampy, affording an excellent obstacle to any hostile infantry attack. Due to the lack of communication forward of Battalion Headquarters, and to the fact that it is impossible to maintain surface lines, our gunners have not as yet been able to take advantage of the observation given by our forward positions. It is impossible for them to register their guns although forward observers have spotted a number of enemy batteries in action (around Moorslede) on which we have direct observation.






The activity of enemy aircraft has been much less during the past two days due to the almost constant patrolling of formations of our fighting planes. During the first four days of the tour, unmolested enemy planes flew at will over our forward positions, often descending to within two or three hundred feet from the ground, and sprinkling our troops with machine gun fire. The material damage done was negligible but from the point of view of morale, the bad effect is considerable.




